

# Ron Davis, IDNR/OWR – Excellence in Mitigation

This award is given to an individual or community that has encouraged flood hazard reduction through a buyout program, retrofitting, preparation of a mitigation plan, or other similar mitigation efforts.

Ron Davis is a seasoned professional in the field of disaster mitigation with a career spanning over three decades. He has made an incredible impact on the approach to hazard risk reduction and community resilience in the State of Illinois. Ron started with IEMA in 1995 in the aftermath of the Great Flood of 1993. In 2003, he earned the title of State Hazard Mitigation Officer and held that title for 15 years before taking a position at IDNR to run their mitigation program (2018).


His work has significantly advanced the state's capacity to mitigate the impacts of natural and man-made disasters. As a leading figure in Illinois' mitigation efforts, Ron's contributions have not only safeguarded communities but also propelled the state into a position of national leadership in disaster mitigation and resilience planning.

Ron was instrumental in the development and promotion of Illinois' State Hazard Mitigation Plan, a cornerstone document that guides the state in reducing risk from natural hazards through proactive planning and action. Under his guidance, the plan has evolved to include climate adaptation

strategies, making Illinois one of the first states to integrate climate change considerations into its hazard mitigation framework. This forward-thinking approach has served as a model for other states grappling with similar challenges.





# Paul Kendzior, PE, CFM, Village of Libertyville – Floodplain Manager of the Year

This award recognizes outstanding individual efforts and contributions at the local level. The award honors an individual responsible for the development of a distinguished local program or activity, or someone who struggles to implement flood hazard reduction at the local level in the absence of sophisticated programs and support.

Paul Kendzior has worked in the field of floodplain and stormwater management for the past 36 years. Paul started his career at RJN Group completing Location Drainage Studies for various waterway crossings in IDOT's District 1. He then transitioned to the public sector with the Village of Northbrook in 1995, leading the Village to Class 7 after initiating their application into the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) Community Rating System (CRS). While at Northbrook, Paul also led the development of the Village's first Master Stormwater Management Plan and two Addendums. All recommended capital flood reduction projects were funded by the creation of a stormwater utility fee. One example project is the award-winning Wescott Park Storage which involved the installation of a 23-acre-foot

underground stormwater detention vault.

Works, Paul led the effort to apply for CRS program and ultimately elevated Libertyville to a Class 6 rating. At Libertyville, he also initiated the Village's first Master Stormwater Management Plan in 2017. The Master Plan contained 10 capital flood reduction projects at an estimated total cost of \$54 million. Once again, Paul assisted in the development and approval of a stormwater utility fee to fund the projects, of which three have been completed.









# Julie Lomax, CFM, P.E., CRS Committee Chair – Floodplain Manager of the Year

This award recognizes outstanding individual efforts and contributions at the local level. The award honors an individual responsible

for the development of a distinguished local program or activity, or someone who struggles to implement flood hazard reduction at the local level in the absence of sophisticated programs and support.

Julie Lomax has been the Chair of the Community Rating System (CRS) Committee for the Illinois Association for Floodplain and Stormwater Management (IAFSM) since 2015 and is the leader of the Illinois CRS Users Group. As the CRS Chair, Julie has been instrumental in driving forward initiatives that have significantly improved floodplain management practices across Illinois. Her leadership has not only enhanced the participation of Illinois communities in the CRS program but also increased their access to reduced flood insurance premiums.

She has developed training programs, workshops, and resources aimed at local officials, professionals, and the general public, demystifying what it takes for a community to be part of the CRS program. Julie credits much of this success to the vast resources available to her through her IAFSM contacts and peers as well as pandemic creativity.

With the rise of virtual meetings and the 2021 Addendum to the CRS User's Manual providing topics for meetings, it was now possible to get people together from the entire state via Zoom. Julie used this opportunity to invite subject matter experts to be guest presenters on various CRS topics at the CRS Users Group meetings. Additionally, Julie has been able to assist in the hosting of two field-deployed CRS training courses – one in 2019 and another in 2023.




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# **City of Batavia - Stormwater Management Award**

Awarded to a floodplain manager, an individual, a group of individuals, a consultant, or an agency who improved stormwater management or reduced urban flood risks through creative engineering, regulatory measures, or other approaches. The award can also be considered for someone who struggles to implement flood hazard reduction at the local level in the absence of sophisticated programs and support.

The City of Batavia has taken a proactive approach to stormwater management over the last 10 years, investing time and resources to improve its stormwater management and assets. This has been the most evident within the Mahoney Creek Watershed. The City has been working on planning and implementing projects to holistically manage stormwater runoff, reduce flooding, and improve water quality.

In 2021, Batavia started the development of the Mahoney Creek Watershed-Based Plan. The Watershed-Based Plan was written to include the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) nine key elements required to improve water quality. The planning documents identified numerous projects within the City of Batavia. Project implementation has already begun with the City investing nearly one million dollars to design and construct a project to create wetland detention at the Mahoney Creek Tributary's headwaters.

In 2022, the City constructed the Kirk Road Stormwater Management Basin which created 7.6 acre-feet of wetland detention and cut the 100-year critical flow to the Mahoney Creek Tributary in half. After construction, the City noted a reduction in roadway flooding along the tributary and reduced yard flooding along the stream.

# Erin Conley, CFM & Marilyn Sucoe, CFM, P.E., IDNR/OWR – Journalism or Public Education Award

This award is generally given to a media outlet that has produced floodplain or stormwater management special features during the year. The award can include individuals or agencies who have contributed to public awareness of floodplain or stormwater management issues.

The state began issuing the quarterly e-newsletter, The Flood Record, in September 2020 to the 896 NFIP communities in Illinois. Marilyn Sucoe created the first email list from FEMA's community contact database and the first email had over 400 failures. After weeks of phone calls to libraries and even volunteer fire departments, Marilyn was able to compile a successful email list. Erin and Marilyn have now grown the list to over 1700 email addresses. To date, there have been 15 issues of The Flood Record that cover everything floodplain-related including regulations, permitting, mapping, grants, and training opportunities. Some of the articles are even reprinted in The IAFSM Current. One Mayor called to say he was republishing an article concerning establishing Base Flood Elevations in Zone A floodplains in the town's newsletter.

Starting last year, their outreach efforts expanded to include a series of webinars held most months of the year. These webinars have covered topics including elevation certificates, enforcement, floodway permitting, flood insurance, and substantial damage/improvement. While most of the webinars are only an hour long, longer webinars are being added to allow for a more in-depth discussion on some topics. The webinars provide credits for CFMs and PEs. Attendance at the webinars often reaches 100 or more.

# **Senator David Koehler - Legislative Award**

This award honors Illinois law makers or local officials for their efforts in floodplain issues. The award can also be given to an individual who makes extraordinary efforts to encourage the passage of legislation or to a community that has adopted unique local regulations that promote floodplain management or flood damage reduction.

In 2022, State Senator Dave Koehler played a pivotal role in introducing the "Clean Sweep" program in Peoria and Fulton County. With an eye towards water quality, this initiative facilitated the responsible disposal of unwanted agricultural pesticides for a diverse range of stakeholders, including farmers, retired farmers, nursery owners, private pesticide applicators, structural pest control applicators, and landowners.

Continuing the commitment to environmental stewardship, the senator successfully passed Senate Bill 3790. This landmark

legislation led to the creation of the Renewable Energy Component Recycling Task Force, tasked with exploring sustainable options for recycling and end-of-life management of renewable generation components and energy storage devices.

This year, Senator Dave Koehler is taking the lead on several critical initiatives. Foremost among these is Senate Bill 1556, advocating for the adoption of a clean transportation standard in Illinois. This bill aims to empower the Environmental Protection Agency to establish rules for a credit marketplace for low-emission fuels, with the goal of reducing carbon emissions in the transportation sector by 20% within a decade of adoption.

Additionally, the Senator is spearheading Senate Bill 2628 to grant the Illinois Department of Natural Resources the necessary authority to define procedures ensuring state agency compliance with the National Flood Insurance Program. Recognizing a current deficiency in enforcing NFIP procedures for state agencies and state-owned properties, this bill aims to rectify this gap.

# Chris Hanstad, CFM, P.E., ISWS – Young Professional of the Year

This award is to recognize the professional contributions of younger members. The IAFSM Young Professionals Committee established the IAFSM Young Member of the Year Award for the first time in 2024.

Chris Hanstad serves as the Senior Hydraulic Engineer in the Coordinated Hazard Assessment and Mapping Program (CHAMP) at ISWS, leading their hydraulic and hydrologic engineering team of seven engineers with unparalleled dedication and expertise. In the last several years he has successfully overseen data development projects totaling over \$5 million. Notably, these projects were completed meticulously, adhering to FEMA specifications, and were both within budget and on schedule.

In addition to his role as a project leader, Chris has excelled in various capacities. He serves as the Principal Investigator for the MT-2 LOMR Review grants, successfully submitting grant applications and providing quarterly reports to FEMA. Chris's meticulous review and processing of MT-2 cases showcase his commitment to ensuring the highest standards in his work.

Chris's dedication also extends beyond project management. He contributes significantly to CHAMP outreach efforts for Floodplain 101 training and Cooperating Technical Partner (CTP) mentoring tasks. His ability to communicate complex

technical information effectively is well demonstrated through internal presentations at ISWS and externally at IAFSM conferences. In 2021, Chris earned IAFSM's Best Presentation award at the annual conference.

Despite facing challenges such as tight project deadlines, Chris has demonstrated exceptional resilience and leadership. His ability to mediate conflicts, coupled with his open communication style, has contributed to a positive and collaborative work environment.

Chris's management and leadership of his team have been exemplary, especially with the challenges of remote work and hybrid schedules. Bi-weekly H&H team meetings, which he leads, have played a crucial role in organizing the team responsible for completing FEMA data development projects and increasing informal interactions among team members.





# Sarah Wenzel, CFM, P.E. – Outstanding Service Award

Awarded to an IAFSM officer, a Federal, State, or Local Official, or a consultant who has gone above and beyond normal expectations and duties to promote or encourage IAFSM goals. This award may also be given to an agency that has inspired floodplain management

efforts or implemented unique programs that encourage flood

reduction.

Sarah Wenzel joined IAFSM in 2018 as one of two founding members of the IAFSM Young Professionals (YP) Committee. She has played an active role in growing the YP Committee from the ground up since 2018. For the last 3 years, she has served as the YP Committee Chair. During her time at IAFSM, she has succeeded in increasing IAFSM name recognition and visibility in universities, increasing young professional engagement with IAFSM, and expanding IAFSM offerings to young professionals. Sarah passionately strives to bring fresh ideas and renewed enthusiasm to IAFSM.


Sarah was a driving force in the creation and consistent year-over-year expansion of the IAFSM YP Conference Scholarship. The YP Conference Scholarship program has expanded under her guidance to include every University with stormwater, floodplain, and civil engineering programs in Illinois and prominent universities in surrounding states.

Sarah proposed the addition of the IAFSM Young Professional of the Year Award to promote the achievements of early and mid-career IAFSM professionals. This award will be recognized for the first time in 2024.





## When is a LOMR Required?

A Letter of Map Revision (LOMR) is required when the mapped floodway location is changed or there is an increase or decrease in the Base Flood Elevation (BFE). Communities are responsible for obtaining or requiring a LOMR be obtained by a property owner if a development causes a change in the BFE. This could be due to a new road, channel modification, or a flood control project. The BFE could change at the project site but also could change upstream or downstream of the project. Floodplain modeling must extend upstream and downstream to confirm no change to the BFE. The federal regulations, 44 CFR 65.3, explains that a community must maintain the accuracy of their floodplain maps and submit the corrections within six months. The community will ultimately be held responsible if they do not require the LOMR through their permitting process. Some type of surety bond or letter of credit should be required that includes the cost of the LOMR, as-built drawings, and floodplain modeling required to secure the LOMR.

### It is important to understand:

- A local permit is always required for work in the floodplain regardless of any state floodway permit.
- A LOMR is not a federal permit. There is no federal floodplain permit.
- A LOMR is an official change to the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM), typically requested by a community or property owner.
- The local community must require the LOMR as part of the local permit if the BFE changes.
- The State Floodway Rules may not require a LOMR, even when the BFE changes. The state floodway rules are not necessarily NFIP compliant and are used to ensure compliance with state laws only.

A Conditional LOMR (CLOMR) is a letter from FEMA typically commenting on whether a proposed project's floodplain modeling and design will, if built as proposed, result in the desired map change. A CLOMR is required if the floodway is being changed (44 CFR 60.3 d 4). For proposed encroachments in the regulatory floodway, any increase in the BFE requires a CLOMR from FEMA. The federal law does not require a CLOMR for proposed encroachments in the floodplain where a regulatory floodway has not been mapped and adopted.

Recent county-wide floodplain mapping and other Letter of Map Change requests have found numerous cases of new development in the floodway, channels enclosed in a storm sewer or new road crossings. The community will now be responsible for securing the LOMR. If communities have questions about LOMCs, they may reach out to IDNR at Erin.C.Conley@illinois.gov.

# 44 CFR 65.3 Requirement to submit new technical data

A community's base flood elevations may increase or decrease resulting from physical changes affecting flooding conditions. As soon as practicable, but not later than six months after the date such information becomes available, a community shall notify the Administrator of the changes by submitting technical or scientific data in accordance with this part. Such a submission is necessary so that upon confirmation of those physical changes affecting flooding conditions, risk premium rates and flood plain management requirements will be based upon current data.




The National Weather Service (NWS) has unveiled a replacement for the decades-old river information web page called Advanced Hydrologic Prediction Service (AHPS). It has been replaced by the National Water Prediction Service (NWPS), a dynamically updated and much more detailed way to view river and water information.

Some examples of how things changed are summarized below.

### **Map Updates**

- The maps in the previous Advanced Hydrologic Prediction Service (AHPS) - see example to right - are replaced by the new format shown below.
- Observation/Forecast flood status in same icon (circle portion shows current observation and surrounding square shows forecast, if forecast site).
- Robust search and filter capabilities.
- Functional legend to create specific displays for your situational awareness.
- New Hazard Map get all details for any watch/warning in effect (nationally).






New National Water Prediction Service (NWSP) map format

### **Hydrograph Updates**

- The hydrographs in the previous Advanced Hydrologic Prediction Service (AHPS) see example to right are replaced by the new format shown below.
- Much faster updates. Hydrographs are produced with up to the minute data every time you click.
- One click for quick view. Second click for full details. (No mouse over yet.)
- Can look back at 30 days of observations (versus only seven days in prior AHPS).
- Probabilistic graphics now on main hydrographic page (instead of separate tabs).
- New experimental National Water Model guidance. (Has a ways to go before it should be used in operations, but it is available for evaluation.)


New hydrograph format in National Water Prediction Service (NWPS)

**Benjamin Bodus** – Ph.D. student at Marquette University. Studies focus on green stormwater infrastructure design and regulations and water resource management.



**Mario Marrugat Rodríguez** – Master's degree student at the Illinois Institute of Technology. Studies focus on Hydrology, Project Management, Water Works.



## **IAFSM Legislative Committee Update**

Recently, the Legislative Committee embarked upon a rigorous and exhaustive selection process to find a committee member to pen a new and recurring newsletter article. Eventually, the steely gaze of Intrepid Leader Kay Whitlock found its way to me. Now, I've known Kay literally from the very beginning of my sojourn into the netherworld of civil engineering in the mid-1980's. Our paths have crossed many times over the years culminating in the tractor-beam -like request that brought me into the IAFSM Legislative Committee fold a few years ago. Whether it was her memory of my putting together the very first IAFSM newsletters, late in that decade of hair-metal dominance (motto: "If it's too loud, you're too old!"), and deciding that sufficient penance on my part had not yet been paid for that affront. Or, the fact that other committee members were already engaged in ceaseless but honorable toil providing informative and entertaining content for the annual conference presentations ........ the result was that Kay "asked" me to do it. It was at that moment that I paused to recall one of life's great truths. One does not simply "politely refuse" Kay, if one has even modest hopes of approaching actuarial lifetime expectancy limits.

With that epiphany, I became your humble correspondent for all things Legislative Committee-ish. Sure, the pressure of meeting newsletter deadlines is tough. But it's worth it if it keeps you in Kay's good graces and, accordingly, gives you a little more time above-grade, terra firma-wise.



So, let's start at the beginning (a very good place to start, according to the venerable Dame Julie Andrews). Crafting legislation is the process of an established governing body, underwritten by constitutional authority, taking an idea, and turning it into words that become the rules that a populace uses to guide the actions of living and commerce. Legislation is enacted at various governing levels: federal, state, county, and municipal/township. The IAFSM Legislative Committee is interested in monitoring the legislative initiatives that occur at all levels of government; however, for now, we'll focus on what is occurring at the State of Illinois level because states have a unique role in governance. The United States Constitution established a system of "dual sovereignty" wherein power (authority) is apportioned between the States and a central Federal Government. The States ceded some (but not all) of their authority to a central Federal Government and the 10th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution states that any powers that are not specifically defined in the Constitution as belonging to the federal government, belong to the states themselves (think about that for a moment!). Therefore, the legislative endeavors at the state level play a distinct and important role in the lives of the citizenry. IAFSM, being a state-wide organization, is uniquely positioned then to be a valuable resource for Illinois lawmakers in advancing good floodplain and stormwater management policy and practices in the state.

In future newsletter articles, we'll cover the floodplain / stormwater related legislative happenings that may be taking place at other levels of government, around the nation and around the state, as they arise. No doubt that many of those future actions will be of general interest to the IAFSM membership as well as having the potential to be cartoon-worthy.

At all levels of government in the United States, the citizen, acting individually or as part of a common-interest group, plays a pivotal role in their own governance. To paraphrase a familiar saying: *An educated and informed citizenry is a vital requisite for our survival as a free people.* There are two broad categories of understanding that are needed toward that end:

- Knowing the legislative process and,
- Knowing the avenue(s) available to you to participate in that process.

## **IAFSM Legislative Committee Update Continued...**

My esteemed colleagues on the Legislative Committee put together a very, very good synopsis of the Illinois legislative process that was the subject of a presentation at the 2023 Annual Conference, which can be found <u>here</u>.

I would recommend bookmarking this site and/or printing out the slides and keeping them as a handy-dandy reference. Everyone is different, but I understand things best by getting a handle on the big-picture first and then drilling down into the details that comprise that big-picture later. This presentation does a great job of providing that top-down understanding. A few helpful take-aways for me from this presentation:

- The Illinois General Assembly (the House and Senate) operates on two-year cycles.
- The bulk of the work on legislation (i.e. bills) is done in the January to May part of the year.
- Bills are introduced in February.
- The detailed deliberation of bills is done at the Committee level, one in each chamber, that are composed of subsets of the House membership and Senate membership. The committees gather information and take testimony about a bill. The committees work in the late-February to early-April timeframe.

The last slide in the presentation tells you where to go. Not in that sense but how to find out who represents you. At the Illinois General Assembly level, there are only two: a representative and a senator, which should give you a better shot at remembering. The names of those individuals, and more, can be found at <u>elections.il.gov</u>. Type in your address and voilà, the world of government, government, and yet more government is opened to you.

Finally, a list of floodplain and stormwater related bills currently before the Illinois General Assembly is provided below. Enter the number of the House bill (HB) or Senate bill (SB) here to see the details and the status of each bill.

**HB-4207 / SB-2628:** Amends the Rivers, Lakes, and Streams Act. Requires all state agencies to comply with the NFIP and obtain a special development permit from IDNR before developing in the SFHA.

<u>HB-5386 / SB-3669</u>: Wetlands and Small Streams Protection Act. Protects wetlands and small streams no longer covered by federal Clean Water Act.

**SB-2743:** Creates the Water Plan Task Force Act. Requires the task force publish a State Water Plan not less than every 10 years.

**HB-5484:** Creates the Climate-Safe Affordable Housing Act. Requires a report on the state of affordable housing in Illinois with respect to flood risk and climate change.

**HB-5297 / SB-3458:** Creates the Resilient Illinois Revolving Loan Fund. The fund shall be used to provide low interest loans to local government and non-profit organizations for hazard mitigation projects. Requires IEMA to apply for FEMA funding under the federal STORM Act.

**SB-2589:** Amends the Disaster Relief Act. Allows IEMA to provide supplemental grants to those impacted by a federally-declared disaster.

**SB-3586:** The bill amends the Illinois Highway code to increase the relocation expenses that Illinois can offer to people who are displaced by buyouts. New limit would match the federal limit and would be adjusted whenever the federal limit is adjusted.

**HB-4619:** Prohibits Homeowner Associations, Condo Associations, etc. from prohibiting rain water collection systems.

**SB-2781:** Forests, Wetlands, and Prairies Act. Requires the IDNR to maintain and administer a grant plan for local governments to fund (among other things) wetland restoration.
