

### South Shore Community Resilience Plan





A community-driven plan to reduce shoreline erosion and flooding in the South Shore.

- Assessment of existing conditions
- Identification of shoreline management solutions
- Identification of models for funding and financing



### South Shore Community Resilience Plan





**Goal 1:** Reduce shoreline erosion, flooding, and residential property damage in the South Shore neighborhood



Identify stakeholder-driven strategies, priorities, project concepts, and investment models for increasing resiliency in South Shore



### South Shore Community Resilience Plan





**Goal 2:** Promote transferrable, **community-driven** resiliency planning within the Illinois coastal region



Coordinate and facilitate a respectful and inclusive resiliency planning process with residents and stakeholders of South Shore

## Initial Findings delta institute



- Climate change is creating dramatic fluctuations in surface water levels along the shoreline, from historic highs to lows
- Decades of erosion and flooding have damaged private and public property in South Shore, and residents have privately funded repairs and construction of new shoreline protection structures
- South Shore residents express frustration with the City's approach to maintenance of shoreline protection structures and have organized advocacy groups to address problems



## Initial Findings delta institute



- Major federally-funded studies, investments and proposals (from FEMA, USACE, and USDOT) represent opportunities to identify impact projects along the shoreline for reducing erosion and flooding
- City of Chicago has prioritized reinvestment within the South Shore neighborhood, and over the next decade, will be supporting major infrastructure upgrades and redevelopment projects
- Need for establishing consensus around what shoreline restoration work looks like within the South Shore, and how to balance goals around property protection, public access and potential habitat restoration
- Need for trust building with the South Shore community
