Governor's Dam Removal Initiative

On October 26, 2012, Governor Pat Quinn announced an initiative to remove or modify 16 low-head dams throughout the state over the next few years. The goal of the initiative is to improve water quality, aquatic habitat and recreational safety. This initiative is being funded through the Governor's "Illinois Jobs Now!" Capital program.

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources/Office of Water Resources (IDNR/OWR) is the lead state agency for this initiative. The following dams have been identified for removal or modification:

Fairbanks Road Dam, Hofmann Dam and Armitage Dam have recently been removed by the Corps of Engineers with IDNR/OWR acting as the non-federal local sponsor. Seven dams owned by the Forest Preserve District of Cook County (FPDCC) (Dam 4, Touhy Ave, Dempster Street, Dam 2, Dam 1, Winnetka Road and Chick Evans Gold Course) will be

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removed or modified through cooperative endeavor between FPDCC, Corps and IDNR/OWR. The FPDCC is providing land rights and funding to the Corps of Engineers for planning level pre-design activities and through the Corps' Planning Assistance to States Authority. IDNR/OWR will be providing the hydraulic analysis, final analysis, design contract advertising and letting. construction supervision and project funding.

The modification of the North Branch Chicago River Dam at River Park is a joint endeavor between the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago (MWRD) and IDNR/OWR. An Intergovernmental Agreement between MWRD and IDNR/OWR is currently being developed. This agreement will result in preliminary designs for the dam modification.

Tam O'Shanter Dam is owned by the Niles Park District. The removal/modification of this dam will be the responsibility of IDNR/OWR. The analysis of this dam removal/modification is in the very initial phase.

Blackberry Creek Dam is owned by the Yorkville-Bristol Sanitary District. The timeframe for the removal of this dam has been accelerated due to the rapid deterioration of an abutment that the dam shares with a county road. Phase 1 of the removal project, notching the dam by two feet to lower upstream pool stages, has been completed. Phase 2, complete removal of the dam and upstream channel restoration, is under contract and should be complete by early spring of 2013.

The Buzzi-Unicem Dam is a privately owned dam on a privately owned reach of the Vermilion River near Oglesby, Illinois. This reach of the river is a destination for whitewater enthusiasts because of several large whitewater features on the river. The State of Illinois is currently leasing this stretch of the river from the owners in order to provide recreational opportunities for boaters and rafters. Phase 1 and 2 of the dam removal/modification involved installing enhanced warning signs to inform boaters of the presence of the dam, and the placement of large concrete blocks in the scour hole below the dam to decrease the strength of the submerged hydraulic jump. Phase 3 design is in progress and will depend on the future water needs of the dam owners.

Both the Danville Dam and the Ellsworth Park Dam are owned by the City of Danville. IDNR/OWR is finalizing a strategic planning study of the options for removal/modification of these two dams. IDNR/OWR



will review the results of this study with the City of Danville to select an option for removal/modification.

Many lessons were learned during the process of removing Hofmann Dam that will be applied to the remaining 13 dams on the Governor's list. The removal of 13 dams in the next few years will be an exciting challenge that will set the framework for more dam removals in future years.

What Stopped Sandy: How FEMA's Regulations Saved Windansea

Branin's Wharf stood on the Highlands [New Jersey] waterfront, overlooking the Shrewsbury River and Sandy Hook, little more than a seafood shack when Dan Shields bought it with a partner in September 2000 for \$690,000.

They began tearing it down to renovate and that's when the trouble started — trouble Shields is now thankful for after Sandy overwhelmed the borough.


Shields and his partner, Robert Higgins, a chef, expected to spend \$300,000 to spruce it up. But surprise after surprise arose in the guts of the old building. And because the demolition devoured more than half of the existing structure, officials stepped in.


Shields and Higgins had to complete the job under the new building code and that meant meeting Federal Emergency Management Agency standards. The additional cost: more than \$1 million. "We were trying to improve something on the ground with the lowest possible cost. I'll never forget when they issued the stop work order," he said. "I felt like I was victimized, like FEMA was trying to prove a point, trying to flex their muscles and trying to take it out on a little guy like me."

Shields would jokingly call the restaurant a fortress when speaking to a FEMA official he kept in close contact with, he said. Now he uses that word with pride.

For where Sandy ravaged other restaurants and homes in Highlands, the Windansea largely escaped Sandy's wrath.

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Major Flood Insurance Changes

On July 6, 2012, President Obama signed the Biggert-Water Flood Insurance Reform Act. The Act was partially intended to stop the major financial losses taking place in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). The NFIP is now \$18 billion dollars in debt and Hurricane Sandy damages could reach another \$12 billion.

This Act will result in major changes to the NFIP. Policy holders in Illinois will be impacted. Among other things, the Act:

- Removes subsidized premium rates (resulting in much higher premiums) for:
 - o Non-primary residences.
 - o Certain repetitive loss properties,
 - o Substantially damaged properties,
 - o Structures improved more than 30%,
 - o Business properties,
 - o All new flood insurance policies,
 - o Policies where an owner has refused HMGP (mitigation) offers.
- Increases premiums (at 20% per year up to full limits) when structures are mapped into the floodplain.
- Increase lender penalties for failing to require flood insurance on certain loans.
- Requires FEMA to identify and map areas behind levees and dams.
- Requires FEMA to notify all residents when they are mapped in or mapped out of a floodplain.
- Requires FEMA and USACE to develop a consistent levee policy within one year and have this policy functioning within 2 years.

Currently, Illinois has about 50,000 flood insurance policies in effect. The average premium in Illinois is about \$778 per year. Due to the NFIP reform, this premium could increase considerably. In addition, lenders will become much more diligent in making sure borrowers carry flood insurance when required. In Illinois, our top twenty policy communities are shown below, followed by the number of policies:

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Passage of DNR Sustainability Funding Bill

On November 28, 2012, Illinois Department of Natural Resources Director Marc Miller made the following statement about that day's passage of Senate Bill 1566, a crucial funding bill for the IDNR:

"This vote is a victory for conservation and the environment in Illinois; it is also a victory for the economy and communities across the state that use and rely on the services the IDNR provides on a daily basis. I commend State Representative Frank Mautino and State Senator Toi Hutchinson for their leadership and hard work leading up to today's action. I also want to thank the members of Illinois' General Assembly who supported this bill, which will allow us to meet the needs of constituents, including those who use our state parks in the years to come," said IDNR Director Marc Miller.

"While it's important to remember that capturing these new funds will take time, we will work as quickly as we can to put the new revenues toward their intended purpose. Passage of this bill will help us hire critical staff to maintain state parks, fix aging infrastructure, speed up regulatory functions and make a bigger difference in the lives of everyone we serve," added Miller.

Senate Bill 1566 passed the Illinois Senate by a vote of 39-11 and was signed into law by the Governor on December 7, 2012.

FEMA Revised Policy on Base Flood Elevations for Unnumbered A Zones

In October 2011, the NFIP Flood Insurance Manual was revised requiring local community officials to provide written concurrence when the base flood elevation (BFE) for an unnumbered A zone (an unstudied floodplain) was developed from other sources.

FEMA has recently received several inquiries from local officials that this requirement is too restrictive and unnecessary. As a result, FEMA has revised the Flood Insurance Manual, effective January 1, 2013, stating that the BFE for unnumbered A zone may be provided by Federal, state, or local government agencies, such as USGS, US Army Corps of Engineers, Department of Transportation or Division of Water Resources, without requiring written concurrence from the local community officials.

If the surveyor is providing the BFE from one of these sources, he/she must provide the information in Section B, item 11 of the Elevation Certificate. The surveyor may also use the Comments Section to explain the source of the BFE or the surveyor may attach a letter from a Federal, State, or local government agencies, if that is provided.



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New FEMA Elevation Certificate and Floodproofing Certificate

New Elevation Certificates (FEMA Form 086-0-33) and Floodproofing Certificate for Non-Residential Structures (FEMA Form 086-0-34) are now available. FEMA will permit a "phase-in" of the revised Elevation Certificate on a voluntary basis. During the 12-month transition period beginning August 1, 2012, FEMA will accept either the new form or the old form. This voluntary transition period will allow for sufficient time for coordination and training of all affected NFIP stakeholders. Elevations certified after the last day of the transition period must be submitted on the new Elevation Certificate form with the expiration date of July 31, 2015. FEMA's Online LOMC is an internet-based tool that allows applicants to easily request a LOMA. It is a convenient way for applicants to upload all MT-EZ information and supporting documentation and check the status of their application online.

Coming soon, the Online LOMC will be able to process all types of LOMC requests. Once all functionality is phased into the tool, the Online LOMC will be an alternative to the paper MT-1 and MT-2 forms in addition to the MT-EZ.

IAFSM Election Nominations

Floodplain Manager of the year

Recognizes outstanding individual efforts and contributions at the local level.

Outstanding Service

Awarded to an IAFSM officer, a Federal, State, or Local Official, or a consultant who has gone above and beyond normal expectations and duties to promote or encourage IAFSM goals.

Stormwater Management

Awarded to an individual or group who have improved stormwater management or reduced urban flood risks through creative engineering, regulatory measures, or other approaches.

Given to an individual or community that has encouraged flood hazard reduction through a buyout program, retrofitting, preparation of a mitigation plan, or other similar mitigation efforts.

Legislation

Lifetime Achievement


